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FOREWORD

Dear Readers,

Seven years ago, the international community adopted the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction (SFDRR) as a comprehensive framework aimed at reducing disaster risks worldwide. While progress has been made in implementing the framework, recent earthquakes in Turkey and Syria have highlighted the urgent need for effective disaster preparedness and response. The destructive impact of these earthquakes raises concerns about the effectiveness of the "Build Back Better" component of SFDRR, which emphasizes transformative and resilient qualities. Despite advancements in decreasing seismic risk, such as earthquake modeling tools, retrofitting older buildings, and stricter building codes, the occurrence of recent earthquakes has revealed overlooked risk drivers. These drivers include unregulated urbanization, environmental deterioration, and the systemic nature of risk.

"Build back better" involves avoiding relocating individuals to disaster-prone areas and ensuring their resilience in case reconstruction becomes necessary. Prevention is more cost-effective than reconstruction and recovery, yet it is not given priority. It is crucial for governments to prioritize disaster risk reduction efforts and take proactive measures to minimize potential damage to life and property caused by major hazards. Scientists have already warned of a high likelihood of a major earthquake in the Himalayan region. Gujarat has its own share of experiencing several powerful earthquakes, including the devastating Bhuj earthquake of 2001.

While there is an earthquake-proof building policy in place, the effectiveness of its implementation in densely populated cities remains unclear. Although guidelines exist for constructing earthquake-resistant structures, the unpredictability of energy release and subsequent earthquakes introduces ongoing risk.

India's assumption of the G20 Presidency this year and the establishment of the "Working Group on Disaster Risk Reduction" present a credible opportunity to discuss the implementation of preventive measures, improvements in preparedness, response, and recovery efforts, and the reduction of significant and emerging risks in the region.

In response to the implications of new challenges in the field of Disaster Risk Management, GIDM has diligently transformed its capacity-building initiatives. The institute has provided climate change-related training to professionals working in key government departments, community-based organizations, and youth forums, among others. GIDM's training programs have also covered capacity building in disaster risk management for frontline workers such as ASHAs and



ANMs, NCC and other youth volunteers, school teachers, and vulnerable groups like persons with disabilities and children. Recognizing the complexities of multi-hazard scenarios during an ongoing pandemic, GIDM has also delivered targeted capacity-building and Train-the-Trainer programs for hazards such as heatwaves, floods, droughts, and more. The institute has already launched e-courses on the Basics of Disaster Risk Management in English and Gujarati, as well as an e-course on School Safety, which have received encouraging responses nationwide. Furthermore, we plan to introduce an MBA and other PGD courses in DRM in the near future.

In pursuit of professional development in Disaster Risk Reduction and related fields, GIDM has been involved in numerous valuable consultancy projects. We have successfully completed projects such as the preparation of a Disaster Risk Management Plan for the Dahej SEZ region of Bharuch district. GIDM has also developed a research report on Extreme Heat Exposure and Actions for Gujarat, supporting the preparation of the Gujarat State Heat Action Plan, building capacity, raising awareness, and developing sector-wise Standard Operating Procedures (SoPs).

GIDM continually strives to improve its day-to-day operations by adopting up-to-date scientific and management interventions wherever necessary, and our efforts have been duly recognized by the Government of India. We were honored to receive the Subhash Chandra Bose Aapda Prabandhan Puraskar 2022 in the institutional category.

I hope you find this year's Annual Report, which highlights the initiatives and actions undertaken by GIDM in collaboration with government departments and partner agencies in the past year, to be useful. I would like to extend my personal gratitude to all our partners for their unwavering efforts and support.

1. GIDM: A GLANCE

The Gujarat Institute of Disaster Management (GIDM) is registered as an autonomous society on 10 July, 2012 under the provisions of the Societies Registration Act, 1860 and the Bombay Public Trust Act, 1950. The institute has been entrusted with the responsibility of human resource development, capacity building, training, research and documentation in the field of disaster risk management.

1.1 2001 GUJARAT EARTHQUAKE

Gujarat's historic 2001 earthquake called for a nationwide awakening to introspect on prevailing status quo of disaster preparedness in the country. While it was believed by many that the catastrophe might have brought the entire public and private machinery to its knees, the state and the populace rose to the juncture and agilely responded to the event that had engulfed them unreservedly. In times to follow an unprecedented scale of rescue and relief operations were carried out that was ensued with a meticulously designed holistic reconstruction phase that brought a 'Resilient Gujarat' back from the rubble. The scale of the rescue and relief operation was unprecedented. In the days and months that followed, a holistic and comprehensive reconstruction and rehabilitation programme was put in place.

1.2 ESTABLISHMENT

The Government of Gujarat enacted the Gujarat State Disaster Management Act 2003 with a view to mitigating the loss of lives and detrimental effects of disasters on overall socio-economic development of the state. The Gujarat State Disaster Management Authority (GSDMA) duly constituted under the provisions of the Gujarat State Disaster Management Act 2003, came into existence as authority from 1 September 2003 with its headquarters at Gandhinagar. In addition, the Gujarat State Disaster Management Act – 2003 provides:

Section 14: The Authority shall act as a repository of information concerning disasters and disaster management, and shall – (a) Establish an institute

Section 16 (1) (c): The Authority shall promote or cause to be promoted awareness and preparedness and advise and train the community, and stakeholders with a view to increasing capacity of the community and stakeholders to deal with potential disasters by



– (c) Promoting disaster management capacity-building and training programmes amongst communities and other stakeholders.

1.3 GIDM OBJECTIVES

- To serve as the apex institute in the State for disaster risk management capacity building.
- To provide disaster risk management related training to all the stakeholders.
- To assess the training needs of different government departments, offices, boards, corporations, local bodies and non-government organizations and others who may consent to be associated with it.
- To undertake activities for human resource development, public education and community awareness, safety etc. in disaster education and management.
- To undertake quality research projects on disaster risk management and mitigation covering both natural and human induced disasters.
- To act as a resource centre and clearing house of information on disaster risk management by documentation of field experiences including case studies, lessons learnt and best practices.
- To establish and maintain libraries and spread knowledge of disaster risk management.
- To facilitate partnership with reputed national and international organizations, universities, institutions, bodies and individuals specialized in disaster risk management.
- To serve as a centre of excellence on disaster mitigation and management.
- To run and award degree/diploma/certificate courses on disaster risk management on its own or with the affiliation to any other institute/ universities, local/ national/ international.
- To undertake publication of newsletters, journals, reports, occasional papers, study reports etc.

2. GOVERNANCE

2.1 THE GIDM GOVERNING COUNCIL

The GIDM Governing Council is headed by Hon. Chief Minister of the state and acts in supervisory and advisory capacity to the institute to review institute progress and provide advice. The Council provide advice to the Institute on minimum standards for holding the trainings and offering education on Disaster Risk Management and accreditation of the courses. The Governing Council shall consist of eleven members and there shall not be at any time less than seven or more than eleven members.

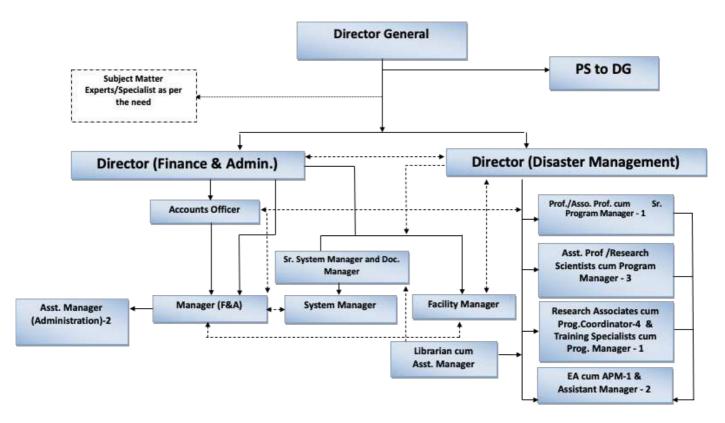

3. ACTIVITIES & MAJOR INITIATIVES

GIDM is focusing on enriching the capacities – in specific areas of prevention, mitigation, preparedness, relief, recovery, rehabilitation, reconstruction and sustainable development – of officials and other functionaries of the State and district administration, autonomous institutions and non-governmental organizations.

Majority of the activities in GIDM have been carried out based on the directions given by the then Hon. Chief Minister of Gujarat, Shri Narendra Modi during its first Governing Council Meeting held in October 2013. Post-2015, due to various Global agreements viz. the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction (SFDRR), Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and Paris Agreement (COP21) along with Hon. Prime Minister's 10 Point Agenda, GIDM has reframed its activities in coherence across these overlapping policy



areas in building coping capacity of all stakeholders with focus on grass-root level first responders.

Training & Capacity Building

To nurture the culture of DRM and preparedness, GIDM conducts capacity building programs leveraging state-of-the-art pedagogies to reach human resources at the grass-root like Virtual Classroom, SATCOM, Virtual Internet Partnership Programs and webinars in addition to residential and blended (Residential & Non-Residential) programs. Each of such program is designed in conformation to Global agreements viz. the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction (SFDRR), Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and Paris Agreement (COP21) along with Hon. Prime Minister's 10 Point Agenda for Disaster Risk Management.

Applied Research

GIDM takes cognizance of the fact that applied research is extremely essential to understand and act in each phase of the Disaster Risk Management (DRM) cycle. GIDM's concerted effort in all spheres of its activities imbibes the principle of research. GIDM exercises evidence-based strategies to achieve its mandates. Thematically, GIDM's research activities focuses on reducing existing risks and preventing new risks, encompassing aspects of climate change as disaster risk amplifier too, thereby empowering practitioners to take risk-informed and sustainable decisions.

Academic Programs

GIDM, as the state nodal institute for capacity building in DRM, is committed to promote knowledge sharing that strengthen local capacities to reduce disaster risk and enhance resilience in collaboration with intergovernmental, governmental and developmental organizations and academia. GIDM recognized the need for urgency to accelerate the capacity building activities to achieve its vision and mission and academic programs is one of the best possible approaches in recent times. GIDM is has developed Certificate Courses in Disaster Risk Management (in Gujarati & English). GIDM is also planning to introduce Diploma course under the affiliation of its partner Universities. GIDM proposes to make these online courses available through Learning Management System (LMS)



provided by the National e-Governance Division (NeGD) of Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY), Government of India.

Documentation

GIDM is in the process of developing a Knowledge Management System in the field of DRM and CCA in line with Hon. Prime Minister of India's one of the 10- point agenda which emphasizes on never missing the opportunity to learn from past disasters. Through such initiatives, GIDM promotes consolidation of existing knowledge as well as accumulation and assimilation of new disaster risk knowledge to strengthen technical and scientific capacity of stakeholders.

Consultancy

GIDM, through innovative and participatory approach, is striving in professional development in Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) and Climate Risk Resilience initiatives. GIDM's projects are formulated to deliver strategic results; promote disaster resilience; meet capacity-building needs in the state; and support stakeholders in planning and implementation of DRR initiatives through innovative approaches. GIDM prides itself of having an expert team, comprising of a perfect blend of academicians, practitioners as well as partners.

Partnership

GIDM believes in the approach put forth by the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction (SFDRR) that the onus of Disaster Risk Reduction is upon all of the society and all of its institutions. Therefore, GIDM builds partnership and coordinating with various International Agencies/ Institutes, National & state level scientific and technological community, academia, and private sector. GIDM has also devised a 3-tier strategy to leverage such partnership in accomplishing various activities in DRM.



4. TRAINING & CAPACITY BUILDING

4.1 Paradigm Shift in Capacity Development

GIDM is committed to fostering a culture of Disaster Risk Management (DRM) and Climate Resilience (CR) through the development of tailored and demand-driven approaches. Our focus is on strengthening stakeholder capacity, including institutional implementation capacities, to effectively analyze and manage disaster and climate risks. Our ultimate goal is to enhance risk-informed planning and risk governance.

To align with global frameworks, the Honorable Prime Minister's 10 Point Agenda, and national and local DRM strategies and policies, GIDM is designing its training initiatives for Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR). These initiatives aim to enhance the coping capacity of all stakeholders, with a specific focus on grass-root level first responders. To reach a wide range of individuals, GIDM utilizes state-of-the-art pedagogical tools such as Virtual Classrooms, SATCOM, Virtual Internet Partnership (VIP) Programs, webinars, as well as Residential, district outreach, and Hybrid (Residential & Online) programs.

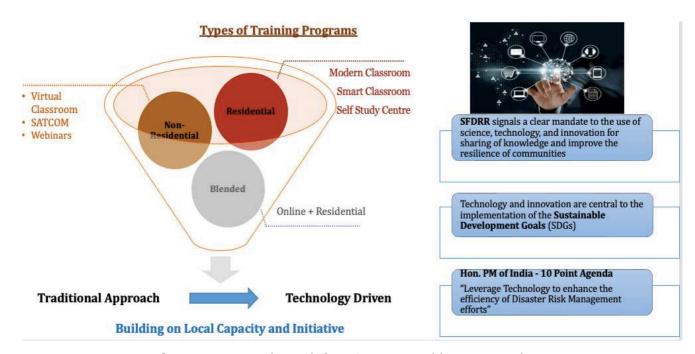


Figure 4.1: Paradigm Shift in Capacity Building Approach

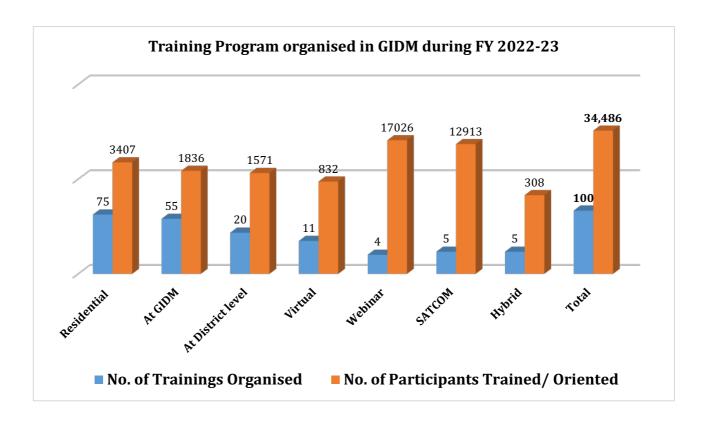


Figure 4.2 Training Programs conducted in 2022-23

In the FY 2022-23, GIDM organized 100 multi-sectoral capacity-building programs and trained/ oriented about 34,500 participants on various aspects of Disaster Risk



Management (DRM) and strengthened the preparedness of the last mile learners. Specialised/Customised training programs targeting women (i.e., Orientation program for all ASHA Workers of the State, etc.) are being organised by GIDM in collaboration with the targeted departments.

The trainings were not limited to GIDM Campus but about 20 District Level trainings were also conducted for enhanced participation and outreach.

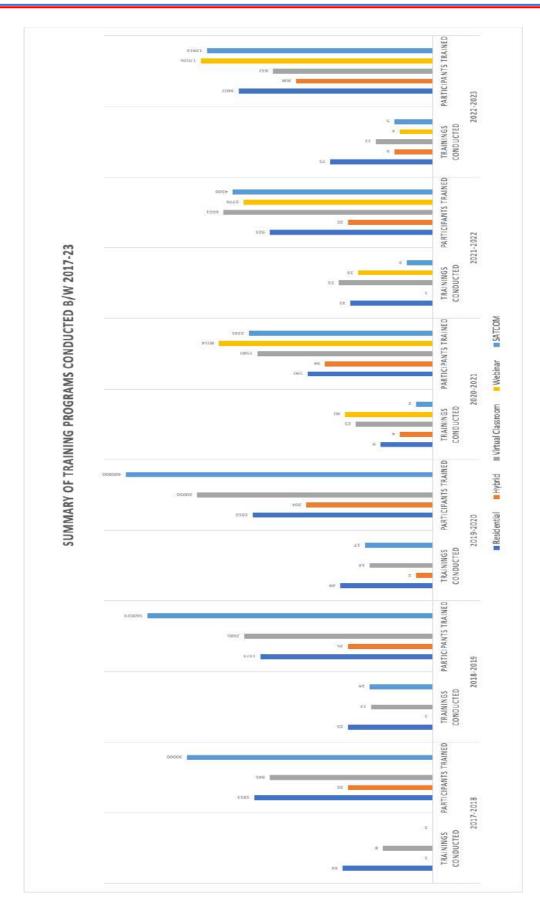


Figure 4.3: GIDM Training Program Growth

4.2 Training & Capacity Building

4.2.1 Training & Capacity Development in Fire Prevention & Life Safety

Considering the need and to ensure that no one is left behind in the process of enhancing fire risk literacy, GIDM undertook training and capacity development activities from all fronts.

A. Training of In-service Fire Officers

GIDM has also initiated a rigorous training program for in-service fire officers on Fire Prevention and life safety course. The training duration is of 5 to 8 days which includes fire drill and theoretical knowledge. Total 8 trainings of in-service fire officers have been conducted wherein 219 in-service officers were trained.





B. Training and Orientation in the areas of Fire Prevention and Life Safety

Many capacity building programs have been organised for the relevant stakeholders in FY 2022-23. The brief information of the same is as under;

4.2.3 Training Workshop on Mainstreaming Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) into Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR)

3-day workshop was conducted on 18-20 January 2023 for Officials of Tata Sustainability Group to develop understanding about Mainstreaming DRR into developmental activities. The workshop aimed to promote discussion on how to mainstream DRR in various sectors of development. Around 30 participants attended the training from all over the India.







4.2.4 Training Programs on Hospital Preparedness for Emergencies (HOPE)

The HOPE Course was primarily designed to prepare hospitals to respond to natural hazards and human induced disasters. GIDM in association with NHM, Gujarat has previously conducted series of trainings for instructors (TFI) on Hospital Preparedness for Emergencies Course with technical support of Asian Disaster Preparedness Centre, (ADPC) Bangkok. In FY 2022-23 one batch of Hospital Preparedness for Emergencies (HOPE) for TFI was conducted on 22-27 August, 2022.



4.2.5 Capacity building of Village Secretary (Talati-cum-Mantri), Panchayat Raj, Rural Housing and Rural Development Department

Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs) play a crucial role in disaster risk management (DRM) at the grassroots level in India. PRIs are at the forefront of disaster risk management, as they possess intimate knowledge of the local context and have direct access to the community.

Their active involvement strengthens the effectiveness of disaster management efforts and ensures a more resilient response to disasters. GIDM has undertaken several training programs on capacity building of PRIs in 2022-23.

4.2.6 Training Program Women as Equal Partners

This training program was arranged on the occasion of International Women's Week on March 9-10, 2023. The participants were all female Talati-cum-Mantri along with all the resource persons. There were 24 participants from various districts of Gujarat like Ahmedabad, Anand, Sabarkantha, Panchmahal and Chhota Udaipur. As these participants had already taken training in GIDM, the level of training was a bit advanced teaching them some core concepts related to gender dimension in disaster



management. The training program aligned with Prime Minister's 10 Point Agenda on DRR (*Pt. 3*), Sustainable Development Goals (*SDG 5*) and, priorities and targets of Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction.



4.3 Documentation

GIDM promotes consolidation of existing knowledge as well as accumulation and assimilation of new disaster risk knowledge to strengthen technical and scientific capacity of stakeholders. With this objective large number of knowledge products have been developed in both English and vernacular language to ensure maximum outreach. In addition, GIDM has supported Revenue Department, Government of Gujarat in developing various reports to be submitted to Government of India after Disasters viz. Morbi Bridge Mishap, Floods in 2022, etc. Some of the key initiatives of GIDM undertaken during the FY 2022-23 in the field of the Applied Research & Documentation in collaboration with various international, national and state level organisations are as under;

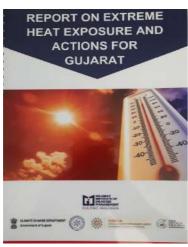


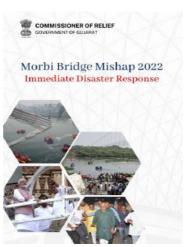

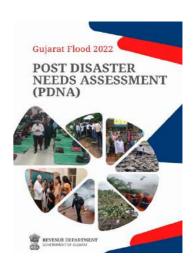












4.4 Approaches towards Quality Improvement

To ensure the quality of the capacity building programs, standard training manual, training modules, guidelines for resource persons/ experts have been developed. Emphasis has been given on mainstreaming of DRM in Development Planning by



forming a sector specific Program Development and Review Committee (PDRC) which also include the experts from government departments/ agencies. The expert members of the PDRC are drawn from the government sector, private sector and individual experts. PDRC provides overall guidance on development of quality training course, mobilize expert resource persons.



Approaches toward Quality Improvement

4.5 GIDM Courses

Realizing this evident gap between what we are taught and what is actually understood globally in this continuously evolving field and with an intention to spread awareness so that our society is capable enough to manage disaster risks and not merely manage disasters, GIDM has rolled out E-Certificate Courses in various genres of DRM.

E-Course on Disaster Risk Management

The E-Course on Disaster Risk Management explains the fundamentals as lucidly as possible, combining experiences from the field with latest research. The units of the course have been designed, keeping in mind, the latest developments at the international and national level (India) like Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction (SFDRR 2015 – 2030), the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development (Sustainable Development Goals), Hon'ble PM's 10 Point Agenda etc. The course has also been launched on DIKSHA portal. DIKSHA is an initiative of the National Council of Educational Research and Training (Ministry of Education, Govt of India). Around



2,25,669 individuals have registered and over 1,62,209 have completed the E Course till date with overall rating of 4.8/5.

One Day self-paced E-Course on School Safety & Security

E Course on School Safety & Security is a comprehensive course that aims to provide information on crucial issues that would help in creating a safe learning environment in the schools and beyond. This course has been designed for everyone who has something to do with schools – from school staffs to teachers, from parents to students themselves and also Govt. officials. The course is divided into 5 modules.







The first module serves as a prologue giving a detailed introduction to the fundamentals of school safety. This module would also include the legal and institutional mandates that support the cause of school safety. The second module will cover the basics of school disaster risk reduction and management in Schools. The third module would be on safe learning facility which will talk about aspects of structural / non-structural safety and water, sanitation & hygiene facilities within the school premises. The fourth module will address the aspects relevant to security of children from abuse (both physical and mental, including sexual) and associated legal provisions. The last module we will introduce learners to a model School Disaster Risk Management Plan. Around 17,729 individuals have registered and over 3692 have completed the E-Course, till date.

One year Post Graduate Diploma in Fire & Life Safety Audit program

Fire and Life Safety Audit of all the buildings is recommended in the National Building Codes – 2016, Part -IV. Considering the huge gap in the trained professional, 1 year Post Graduate Diploma in Fire & Life Safety Audit (PGDFLSA) program is started jointly with GSFC University from last year. This program covers the requirements for fire prevention, fire protection, firefighting & life safety covering all legal requirements pertaining to all types of occupancies.



5. APPLIED RESEARCH

Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction advocates promotion of innovation & research and to ensure access to technology and information on DRR. PM's 10-point Agenda propagates the principle of ensuring the opportunity to learn from past disasters. These two postulates form the basis of research and documentation policy of GIDM.

5.1 Interpretation Centre cum Museum on Disaster Science

GIDM is developing an Interpretation Centre cum Museum on Disaster of international standard on Disaster Risk Management in the context of Gujarat, India and South Asia with special reference to Disaster Management efforts in Gujarat. The project is technical supported by National Institute of Design (NID), Ahmedabad consulting for design and supervision aspect. The objective the project is to design an international standard permanent exhibition on disaster risk reduction and management, in the context of Gujarat, India; with special reference to the pioneering disaster risk management efforts in Gujarat. The core objective of the exhibition is to inculcate sensitivity and awareness in its visitors to strongly believe in 'disaster risk reduction'. To do so, the audiences across multiple demographics must be inspired to work towards risk prevention & reduction and efficient & timely preparedness within their environment and capacities as stakeholders. This in-turn would mean that the exhibition will equip its audiences to assess their immediate environment for risk from hazards & either have the knowledge to or be able to approach the authorities to plan for long-term risk reduction.

5.2 Report on Extreme Heat Exposure and Actions for Gujarat

GIDM in collaboration with Climate Change Department, IIT Gandhinagar, IIPH Gandhinagar has prepared a research Report on Extreme Heat Exposure and Actions for Gujarat to support the Gujarat State Heat Action Plan preparation, build capacity, spread awareness and developing sector wise Standard Operating Procedures (SoPs). The report highlights that Northern India witnessed a new record of average temperature of 36.32 °C, record high since 2010 with 55% rise in deaths due to extreme heat between 2000-2004 and 2017-2021, a recent study published in the



medical journal, The Lancet, has found causing to large scale economic losses. The report has delivered data regarding severity of Heatwave risk and also recommended suitable structural and non-structural approaches to adopt as part of mitigation measures. Besides, it also highlights the different adaptive measures and the need of intersectoral coordination to bring global best practices and implement coherent and real time adaptation to reduce risk of extreme heat.

5.3 3D for Heritage

GIDM in partnership with is working on a project with Nottingham Trent University, Centre for Heritage Conservation, CEPT Research and Development Foundation (CDRF) and Hunnarshala Foundation on "Applicability and scalability of a sustainable re-construction framework for seismic-prone heritage areas of Gujarat, India". GIDM was involved in developing a policy brief and guidance document. Presently, GIDM is developing a disaster risk management plan for Bela Village in Kachchh District.

5.4 Urban Risk Reduction and Resilience

A Comprehensive Approach: Under this project, GIDM with Urban Housing and Urban Development Department has developed modules for Policy Makers, Architects, Engineers and Town Planners at basic and advanced level. Training and capacity building programs will be held in 2023-24 for the UDD department.

5.5 Hospital Disaster Risk Management

Gujarat state has witnessed public health emergencies and being prone to disasters, enhancement of health institutions and developing plans are absolutely necessary. In this regard, GIDM has taken the responsibility to develop Hospital Disaster Risk Management Plan in the state and to implement the same at Primary, Community and Tertiary level hospitals in association with Department of Health & Family Welfare (H&FW). A model Hospital DRM Plan has been developed and under stage of further improvements for pilot implementation in different level health institutions. Besides, training and resilience building activities as part of nodal offers, health and non-health stakeholders, frontline responders capacity development is being taken forward in alignment with GIDM roles and responsibilities.



5.6 GIDM Social Innovation and Learning Lab for DRR

The GIDM Social Innovation and Learning Lab for Disaster Risk Reduction and Resilience Building aims to unite youths, innovators, mission-driven entrepreneurs, experts, organizations, and DRR related stakeholders to find sustainable solutions for tackling the issues faced by communities and future disasters, to make our society resilient and sustainable. The Lab through its multi-stakeholder partnerships will provide a platform to young minds to connect, brainstorm and innovate, to develop sustainable solutions for disaster risk reduction and resilience building that are in line with the SDGs, SFDRR and PM 10 Point Agenda. The GIDM Social Innovation and Learning Lab has the following objectives:

- 1. To provide a platform for young minds to connect, brainstorm and innovate, to develop sustainable solutions for disaster risk reduction and resilience. building that are in line with the SDGs, SFDRR and PM 10 Point Agenda.
- 2. To raise awareness about the importance of innovation in DRR and its role in achieving the SDGs.
- 3. To foster creativity and innovation among young minds and promote the culture of social innovation.
- 4. To build a community of young innovators, experts, and stakeholders including governmental, non-governmental, and private sector organizations that shares knowledge, resources, and best practices for disaster resilience and DRR.
- 5. To facilitate the development and implementation of innovative and sustainable solutions for disaster risk reduction and resilience building

5.6 Rainfall Variability over Gujarat State

The recent case of 2022 rains in Gujarat that arrived late, but after stalling for two

weeks, most of the states in Gujarat had normal, excess, or large excess rainfall to the extent that the state as a whole had a 61% surplus by the end of August. Twenty- six districts of Gujarat, including Chhota Udaipur, Tapi, Navsari, Udaipur, Narmada, Panchmahal, Dang, and Valsad, have suffered flood-like situations. What comes along is damage to life, built infrastructure, and state resources. The damages induced in





the monsoon period of 2022 reflects the vulnerability of the state to such extreme events, and the matter of concern is that such events are more likely to become more frequent in future.

This report is a comprehensive study on Gujarat 2022 rains, expressing the trajectory of rainfall in Gujarat this year and also emphasizing the regular rainfall pattern in Gujarat along with the district-wise trends in rainfall in the past decades. Probable factors responsible for this shift and its effects have also been brought to light to get a complete picture of where we are and what ought to be done?



6. CONSULTANCY

GIDM provides consultancy services to support planning and development of contingency plans, training and capacity building plans and strategies for government bodies, local authorities, private sector and industries. GIDM has diligent array of researchers and professionals pertaining to all blends of risk management initiatives.

The primary purpose is to provide access to consultants and subject matter expertise in order to help Govt. institutions mainstream DRR postulates in their development planning. Based on the request from GIFT City, GIDM prepared a Disaster Risk Management Plan for GIFT City. Several other such projects (DRM Plan for Bhadbhut Barrage, Safety Manual Bhadbhut Barrage project, etc.) were also being taken up by GIDM. List of some of the consultancy projects concluded in FY 2022-23 are as under;

Development of Disaster Risk Management Plan for Dahej SEZ

Dahej SEZ Limited had entrusted GIDM with the preparation of DRM Disaster Plan for Dahej SEZ Region in Bharuch. Dahej SEZ comprises approximately 85 industries, out of which major industries are hazardous process industries and Major Accident Hazard Units. The plan was developed in 3 volumes viz. Hazard Risk Vulnerability Assessment Report, Disaster Risk Management Plan & Hazard specific Action Plan.

7. STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIP

SFDRR promotes an effective and meaningful Partnerships are essential for effective Disaster Risk Management. National DM Policy 2009 talk about a holistic and integrated approach to be evolved towards Disaster Risk Management with emphasis on building Strategic Partnerships. State DM Policy 2002 advocates establishing coordination mechanisms and augment capacity of all the stakeholders.

GIDM recognizes that the pursuit of resilient sustainable development is a multisectoral and transdisciplinary affair and therefore has entered into MoUs with about 40 international and local partners like UNDP, UNDRR, ADPC, ICCROM, ISRO, IMD, Universities and Government Agencies and carries out strategic capacity development programs at sub-national, national and regional levels.





Gujarat State Fire Academy (GSFA)

In compliance with Section 17 of the Gujarat State Fire Prevention and Life Safety Measures Act, 2013, the Urban Development and Urban Housing Department (UD&UHD), Government of Gujarat established the Gujarat State Fire Academy (GSFA) under the Directorate of State Fire Prevention Services in December 2018. Subsequently, on May 12, 2022, UD&UHD made the decision to transfer the GSFA to the Gujarat Institute of Disaster Management (GIDM), subject to the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between GIDM and the Directorate of State Fire Prevention Services (SFPS). On November 1, 2022, an MoU was signed between GIDM and SFPS, solidifying the smooth functioning of GSFA under the operational and managerial responsibilities of the Director-General of GIDM. Under the collaborative efforts of GIDM, GSFA, UD&UHD, and SFPS, a series of training programs for firemen, leading firemen, and driver cum Pump Operators have been initiated. The course content and Training Calendar for the year 2023-2024 will be finalized in consultation with the Director of State Fire Prevention Services, Chief Executive of GSFA, and other senior officials from the fire services. These coordinated endeavors aim to ensure effective training and skill development in fire prevention and response. Summary of trainings conducted with GFA in FY 2022-23 are:

8. G20 Working Group on Disaster Risk Reduction

In December 2022, India assumed the Presidency of the G20, and for the first time, Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) was included as a Working Group during India's tenure. On March 29, 2023, a Curtain Raiser Event titled 'Learning from Disasters: Memorialising disasters, learning, building back better, investing in resilience' took place at GIDM, serving as a prelude to the inaugural meeting of the Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) Working Group under India's G20 Presidency.



The event was chaired by Dr. P. K. Mishra, Principal Secretary to the Honorable Prime Minister of India. It brought together more than 80 delegates from G20 countries, Invitee Countries, as well as international and regional organizations. The purpose was to share experiences of past disasters and how the learnings from those events have been utilized to shape a green, inclusive, and resilient future. The session emphasized the importance of disasters in raising risk awareness and the potential of disaster memories in altering perceptions and promoting resilience. Overall, the event aimed to advocate the principles of "build back better" and "build forward smarter" for future infrastructure development to mitigate and prevent potential disasters.



9. OTHER RESPONSIBILITIES & INITIATIVES

9.1 Functioning of SAARC Disaster Management Centre (IU) in GIDM Campus

In November 2016, the SAARC Disaster Management Centre (IU) was established within the premises of GIDM. Its vision is to become a Center of Excellence for regional cooperation and specialized service delivery to Member States, which include Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka.

The primary focus of the center is on Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR), Response, and Recovery for Sustainable Development. The Government of India has decided to reestablish the interim unit of the SAARC Disaster Management Centre (SDMC - IU) with an expanded role. This involves merging four former SAARC centers: the SAARC Disaster Management Centre (SDMC) in New Delhi, India; the SAARC Meteorological Research Centre (SMRC) in Dhaka, Bangladesh; the SAARC Forestry Centre (SFC) in Thimphu, Bhutan; and the SAARC Coastal Zone Management Centre (SCZMC) in Male, Maldives. The new unit will be located on the premises of the Gujarat Institute of Disaster Management Campus in Gujarat.



As per the official memorandum issued by the Government of India, the Director-General of GIDM has been designated as the Director of the SDMC (IU). The SDMC (IU) aims to provide policy advice, technical support on system development, capacity-building services, and training to the SAARC Member countries. The funding for the activities of SDMC (IU) is currently provided by the Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India



9.2 ICT Initiatives

GUIDE LMS

In order to enforce and facilitate Capacity Building for Education 4.0, GIDM has developed an in-house Learning Management System "GUIDE" (GIDM/ GSFCU's Unified Internet based eDucational Ecosystem) in collaboration with GSFC University.



Responsive Web-Portal

The objective of website is to provide an opportunity to the people to have an exposure to latest information on the activities which are being carried out by the institute. GIDM has developed responsive web portal incorporating various latest features and being updated regularly.

GIDM Administrative cum Academic Reforms Version 1.0

In order to carry out paperless, speedy and transparent administrative and training related activities, a web-based integrated solution has been developed. This E Governance/ M- Governance system enables GIDM staff to access it on mobile or computer and process/approve any proposal from anywhere. The GIDM Administrative cum Academic Reforms Version 1.0 (GARV 1.0) includes 6 modules;

 Approval Management System (AMS) AMS helps to carry out paperless, speedy and transparent administrative procedures/ approvals. This E-Governance / M-Governance initiative enables GIDM staff to access it on mobile/ computer and approve any proposal at any time.



- 2. Registry Management System (RMS) RMS is inward-outward register system which is designed to work for various branch offices which are sending & receiving daily courier/post physical mail. This application takes care of inward & outward flow and also the reporting part.
- 3. Facility Management System (FMS) FMS has been developed to override the problems prevailing in the practicing manual management of GIDM's facility during trainings events.
- 4. Training Management System (TMS) TMS enables end to end process of training management which includes communication to nominating authority resource person empanelment, participant management, online attendance, certificate generation etc.
- 5. HR & Payroll Management System (HMS) HMS enables online leave application & approval, pay slip generation, employee profile and CV generation etc.
- 6. Inventory Management System (IMS) IMS enables stock register, indent management, assets management etc.

9.3 Green Initiatives

Tree Plantation





GIDM has taken various initiatives in protecting environment. GIDM has developed lush green urban forest area using Miyawaki methodology. More than 7000 plants and trees have been planted in and around GIDM campus. Moreover, lawn area has been developed to create green atmosphere. In the Year 2020-21, around 350 plants and saplings purchased from Govt. nursery have been planted in the campus. GIDM has developed nursery of size 6.7 m x 12.80 m for in-house preparation saplings. Around 400 saplings, including Black Ficus, Champa, Money plant, Bougainvillea, Naag Champa, Mehdi, Duranta etc., have already been prepared and planted.

Solar Plant Installation

In order to reduce the dependence on conventionally generated electricity, GIDM is in process of installation of Grid Connected 110 KW (AC) Rooftop Solar PV System in the campus. The estimated cost for installation of the system is approximately 41 lacs with payback period of 5.5-6 years (This means that after payback period of 5.5-6 years, the profits from the solar power plant together would have saved the expenditure on electricity bill equaling to the original investment of 41 lac).

- 1 Gujarat Institute of Disaster Management (GIDM) (The Trust or Society) is registered under the provisions of Societies Registration Act, 1860 (Registration No GUI/1974/Gandhinagar) and Bombay Public Trust Act, 1950 (Registration no. F/1934/Gandhinagar). The Society is also registered under Section 12AA of the Income Tax Act, 1961 vide unique registration n. AABTG7897CE20217 from September 24, 2021. The main object of the society is to serve as apex institute in the Gujarat State for disaster management training and capacity building. The Government of India and the Government of Gujarat have provided fund out of its budgetary allocation.
