 Gujarat State Disaster Management Act, 2003 mandates establishment of an Institute of Disaster Management in the State

 Natural Disaster Management (NDM) cell was operating at Sardar Patel Institute of Public Administration (SPIPA) since 1996 - Transferred to GSDMA from 1 April 2004 and subsequently, renamed as Gujarat Institute of Disaster Management (GIDM) in December 2005

• From August 2012, GIDM started functioning from New Campus

Initiatives in SAARC Disaster Management Centre (IU)



SDMC (IU)



- Set up in October 2006 at National Institute of Disaster Management (NIDM) premises, New Delhi, India.
- In November 2016, expanded the role by merging the other erstwhile Regional Centres namely, (1) SAARC Meteorological Research Centre (SMRC Dhaka, Bangladesh); (2) SAARC Forestry Centre (SFC Thimphu, Bhutan); and (3) SAARC Coastal Zone Management Centre (SCZMC Male, Maldives) with (4)SAARC Disaster Management Centre (SDMC).
- Now, Operational from Gujarat Institute of Disaster Management (GIDM) Premises, Gandhinagar, Gujarat, India
- Presently, being Interim Unit (IU), Funding support from Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India.



OVERVIEW

Pilot projects in India and Bangladesh demonstrate that index-based weather insurance products, developed using satellite technology, can reduce the financial risks to smallholder farmers from floods and droughts. CLIMATE CONTEXT

Climate change magnifies the risk and cost of disasters. The economic impact of environment-related disasters has risen from around USD \$26 billion per year in the 1980s to USD \$160 billion in 2018 (Baur and Parker, 2016; Munioh Re. 2018), in South Asia, olimate change is stready increasing the frequency and intensity of disasters, contributing to population displacement, exacerbating conflicts and affecting efforts to reduce poverty and inequality. Many of the region's most vulnerable people live in vast agrarian bets within the indus. Ganges and Brahmaputra-Meghna river basins. RECOMMENDATIONS

Action points by which regional organizations such as the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) can strengthen disaster insurance programs:

Advise governments on 1) how best to reform policies and regulations around index-based weather incurance (e.g., financial incentives, premium subsidies), and 2) ways to develop effective and inclusive products, so that incurance can be readily incorporated into disaster risk management strategies for many different people

Strengthen microfinance institutions to boost smallholders' access to credit

Promote best practice in design and policy aspects of index-based weather incurance, including couth-couth learning, to promote wider
